About Prestige Proof Sets

When the U.S. Mint introduced special commemorative coins in the early 1980s, they were sold individually and as part of “Prestige” proof sets. But most collectors bought their commemorative proofs individually. And most proof set buyers continued to acquire regular 5-coin sets each year. The result is that Prestige proof sets have become by far the scarcest and often most affordable form of these coins. Most mintages were 10% or less of the same date's regular 5-coin proof set.

About Modern Commemoratives

Virtually every modern commemorative features a unique obverse and reverse design, including some of the most admired in U.S. minting history. Some of America’s finest artists and sculptors design these coins, which are authorized by Congress and produced by the United States Mint. They honor people, places and events important to our great country. These commemorative dollar and half dollar issues were struck in very limited mintages and for one year only making them of great interest to collectors.

About U.S. Silver Proof Sets

U.S. proof sets contained 90% silver coins up until 1964. Later sets have clad coins. In 1992, the U.S. Mint began issuing special silver proof sets along with the years regular proof sets. The silver sets contain 90% silver dimes, quarters and half dollars. These sets have substantially small mintages that the years regular proof sets.

About Silver Coinage

Since the 1790s, the U.S. Mint had issued 90% silver coins as a hard-asset foundation for the American economy. But in the 1960s the market price of silver exceeded the coins’ face value. The Coinage Act of 1965 reduced or replaced silver content in U.S. dimes, quarters, half dollars and dollars.

Thus 1964 was the last year that regular U.S. coins were struck with 90% silver content. Some silver clad coinage, with 40% silver content, was produced until 1970. Silver content was completely eliminated in circulating coins in 1971.
